Gen Z communication: a cheat sheet for teachers



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
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Introduction



Gen Z students aren't like previous generations. They're not even completely like Millennials (although there are some striking similarities). What do instructors need to know when teaching them?

This cheat sheet explains what instructors need to know about Gen Z students for a successful learning experience.

What defines Gen Z?



Researchers generally agree <u>Gen Zers</u> were born between 1996 and 2007. This is the first generation to grow up in a world where the internet existed; they've never lived without it.

As a result, many Gen Z students have grown up with mobile devices. However, that doesn't mean that they're security-savvy or that they know how to find reliable information online.

In addition, Gen Zers have been impacted by the global health crisis. They had been set to inherit a strong economy and low unemployment. Lockdowns and health restrictions led to layoffs and pay cuts. A March 2020 survey from the Pew Center revealed half of 18-23 year-olds had either lost their jobs or lived in a household in which someone had lost a job or taken a pay cut.

Understanding Gen Z students also involves recognizing what they value. Gen Z students tend to care deeply about equality and equitable outcomes; researchers say Gen Zers see themselves as <u>loyal</u>, <u>thoughtful</u>, <u>compassionate</u>, <u>open-minded</u>, <u>and responsible</u> (these same researchers note that in reality, Gen Z students like to work alone and sometimes lack creativity).

How can educators communicate with Gen Z students?

With all that in mind, here's what educators must keep in mind about communicating with Gen Z students:

- The right communications platform streamlines communications and improves the learning experience
- Make communication transparent
- Make learning meaningful
- Ensure hybrid and in-person learning are engaging
- Prioritize reliability and security


Choose the right communications platform
